## Southview pair advances

### Vens brothers reach Division I state semifinals

WOOSTER, Ohio — During their initial trip together at the Division I state boys tennis tournament a season ago, the Southview doubles team of brothers Isaac and Landon Vens left believing nerves had played a role in sending them to an earlier-than-hoped-for exit.

Their performance during the first day of their return trip Thursday at the College of Wooster showed just

how far they've come in not only mental toughness but in stamina.

Isaac, a senior, and Landon, a sophomore, are headed to a state semifinal today against the Springboro team of senior Drew Baumgartner and sophomore Peyton Nelson after winning their first two state matches. New Albany seniors Abhinav Dandu and Jackson Clements and the Canton GlenOak duo of senior Dylan Wiles and sophomore Jack Slay will play in the other semifinal match.

"Last year we were really nervous being here, just lots of nerves," Landon Vens said. "I didn't play my best. Last year, too, we looked ahead and slipped a little bit in the second round. This year, I thought we played very confidently and very well. It was a

great way to start off the tournament for sure."

Isaac Vens is making his third state appearance after reaching a quarterfinal in singles in 2023.

Last season, he teamed with his brother to win their first state match before losing in the second round.

They've won all nine of their doubles matches this postseason, beginning with a 6-0, 6-0 win over sophomore Owen Hawley and junior Luca Milicki from Upper Arlington in the first round.

Then in the second round, senior Henrique Sa and sophomore Zelin Shen from Hudson took the duo to the brink, winning the first set 6-1 before

## Analyzing the Walleye-Lions Kelly Cup Finals series

The Toledo Walleye and Trois-Rivières Lions are the final teams left standing in the ECHL playoffs and the evenly matched clubs begin battling for the Kelly Cup this week.

Just one point separated the teams during the regular season.

Toledo defeated Kansas City 4 games to 1 to win the Western Conference finals. Trois-Rivières eliminated three-time defending Kelly Cup champion Florida 4 games to 2 to win the Eastern Conference Finals.

The teams have never met either in the regular season or postseason.

During the regular season, Toledo (44-17-11) finished with 99 points. TR (45-19-8) finished with 98 points. The Walleye won the Central Division title and the Lions won the North Division title.

The Walleye are 12-3 in the playoffs, while the Lions are 12-4.

Toledo has scored 54 goals in 15 postseason games and ranks second at 3.60 goals per game.

Trois-Rivières has scored 46 goals in

16 games and ranks sixth at 2.88 goals per game.

Defensively, the Lions lead the ECHL in goals allowed at 1.63 per game. The Walleye rank fifth at 2.60 goals yielded per contest.

The Lions swept Reading 4-0 in the opening round and then defeated Norfolk 4-2 to win the North Division finals. The Lions then opened the Eastern Conference finals with two road wins at Florida (1-0 and 2-1). They then lost two in a row at home before winning the next two to knock out the Everblades.

## NCAA looks to bigger bracket

### Field could expand to 76

ORLANDO, Fla. — NCAA President Charlie Baker said Thursday he sees value in expanding the NCAA tournament by a handful of teams and wants to reach a decision on the matter in the next few months.

Baker spoke during Big 12 spring meetings, where conference leaders are discussing everything from the multibillion-dollar revenue-sharing House settlement to complexities brought on by the transfer portal and name, image and likeness compensation.

Baker discussed the idea of expanding from 68 teams to 72 or 76.

"We've had good conversations with CBS and WBD," Baker said, referring to Warner Bros. Discovery, whose holdings include the Turner networks that air NCAA tournament games. "Our goal here is to try to sort of get to either yes or no sometime in the next few months because there's a lot of logistical work that would be associated with doing this. If we were to go down this road, you just think about the opening weekends, who has to travel the longest, it gets complicated."

The NCAA tournament expanded from 64 to 68 teams in 2011. The change introduced the First Four round, a set of pre-tournament games in which the four lowest-seeded at-large teams and four lowest-seeded conference champions compete for spots in the traditional 64-team bracket.

Baker indicated that the current formula has flaws and said it would be beneficial to give more opportunities to worthy teams.

"If you have a tournament that's got 64 or 68 teams in it, you're going to have a bunch of teams that are probably among what most

## Graf shutout lifts Generals

### Anthony Wayne edges Northview in district final

BOWLING GREEN — In a classic pitcher's duel between two Northern Lakes League hurlers who will continue their careers in Columbus, top-seeded Anthony Wayne emerged with a 2-0 victory over Northview in a Division II district baseball final Thursday at Carter Park in Bowling Green.

The Generals (21-4), who were ranked No. 2 in the final D-II state coaches poll, will face unranked Trenton Edgewood (17-7) in a regional semifinal at 5 p.m. Tuesday in Xenia. The Cougars advanced with a 5-4 district-final win over 10th-ranked Troy on Thursday at Clarksville Clinton-Massie.

Hard-throwing AW right-hander Owen Graf, who will pitch at Ohio State University, was a little bit stin-

gier than his counterpart, Northview's crafty lefty Nick Schantz, who will play for Capital University.

In a game that took just 1 hour and 15 minutes to complete, Graf blanked the Wildcats on just two hits, striking out six batters and walking two in seven innings, lifting his season record to 7-1 and lowering his earned run average to 1.57.

"Owen Graf gives us a chance to win every time he takes the mound," Anthony Wayne coach Ryan Donley said. "He's a great competitor and has good stuff. Today, he didn't have his best stuff, but he found a way.

# Griffin still on heater with 65

## Winner at Colonial gets off to sizzling start at Memorial

DUBLIN, Ohio — Ben Griffin resumed the great play that brought him his first individual PGA Tour victory last week, hitting two shots in the water and still posting a 7-under 65 on Thursday in the Memorial on a course with rough as dense as a U.S. Open.

Griffin isn't taking victory laps after winning at Colonial. He just kept making birdies, along with an eagle on the par-5 seventh hole with a 3-wood into 12 feet. He led by two shots over Collin Morikawa, with Max Homa another stroke behind.

Defending champion Scottie Scheffler wasn't at his best and still managed a 70, his 19th consecutive tournament in which he opened with a round par.

Griffin was playing so well that his two water balls — on the par-5 11th and par-3 12th — only led to bogeys when such mistakes punished so many other players.

“Yeah, a couple water balls — really need to go to the range and work on my game to clean that stuff up,” Griffin said with a laugh.

He knew this was a good one. Muirfield Village was soft enough from rain the past two days that good scores were available provided shots came from the fairway, and not from rough that Justin Thomas had

said was comparable to what they will face at Oakmont in the U.S. Open.

“Basically a U.S. Open we're playing,” Keegan Bradley said. “I'm going to be playing back-to-back U.S. Opens here. But the course is very fair, setup nice. Just a tough test.”

The numbers bear that out, whether it was only 13 players who broke par in a gentle wind, or the eight players who made triple bogey on seven of the holes at Muirfield Village.

Griffin set the pace early by going out in 31, and then ran into a few problems with the water. He tried to reach the green on the 11th, came up short and into the water, and missed a 10-foot par putt. On

the 12th, his tee shot bounced back down the slope into the water. He saved bogey with a 6-foot putt.

But what a finish — a 15-foot birdie on the par-3 16th, a 12-foot birdie on the 17th, and holing out from a little more than 50 feet up the ridge on the 18th for a third straight birdie.

“It was an incredible day,” Griffin said. “Kind of building on what I was doing last week, making a ton of birdies, staying aggressive. This is one of the toughest golf courses we play on four and you've got to be on your game to make birdies and give yourself a lot of looks.”

Shane Lowry played alongside Griffin and had a 69, one of only six players to break 70.

It might not have felt that good the way Griffin was playing.

“I told him when we finished, ‘Keep it going, things will turn around for you pretty soon,’” Lowry said with a smile. “He pretty much holed everything he looked at today. It was good. We bounced off each other, we all played really nicely.”

“My 3 under doesn't look that great beside his 7 under, but 3 under is a good score out there on this course,” he said. “It's pretty difficult.”

Homa keeps trying to piece together his game that allowed him to reach No. 10 in the world when he played the Memorial last year. Now he is at No. 87 and faces a long week — a tough test at Muirfield Village, and then 36 holes of U.S. Open qualifying Monday.

“I told my coach last night this is the best my swing has felt in a really long time. Then the whole game kind of felt like that,” Homa said. “I didn't need to shoot a low number to validate that, but it just feels nice.”

Nick Taylor had one of the 10 double bogeys — two others made triple bogey — on the par-3 12th, but the Canadian rallied with two birdies on his final three holes for a 69.

Scheffler won the PGA Championship and tried to get as much rest as he could ahead of Colonial, where he still tied for fourth.

Mikesch, who came to Toledo from Green Bay of the USHL, spent seven seasons (2004-11) as an assistant coach at Michigan Tech University. The former forward, who is originally from Hancock, Mich., played for Michigan Tech from 1992-96 and then in eight seasons of pro hockey in the AHL, IHL, ECHL, and Germany.

Trois-Rivieres coach Ron Choules, who is in his second season at the helm, earned a two-year extension at the end of the regular season through the 2026-27 season. He led the Lions to their first division title. Choules finished second in coach of the year behind South Carolina's Jared Nightingale. He has a 76-49-16 record in the regular season.

Choules has more than 15 years of experience, including in the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League (QMJHL). A former 12th-round selection of the NHL's Toronto Maple Leafs in 1983, the forward played in the QMJHL, AHL, and IHL.

### OVERALL

TR has strong special teams play, while the Walleye have been at their best in 5-on-5 play.

Both teams are 7-3-0 in their past 10 games.

The key for both teams will be which gets out of the gates quicker — both within the series and within each game. Toledo is 8-0 when scoring first, TR is 12-2 when scoring first. The 2-3-2 format makes it imperative for the Walleye to continue their solid play at the Huntington Center.

The Walleye look to continue to get balanced scoring while the Lions look for Cavallin to continue his stingy play.

As often is the case in the playoffs, special teams play, goaltending performance, and consistency in all zones will be the keys to victory.

The Lions are 7-1 on the road and 5-3 at home. Toledo is 6-2 at home and 6-1 on the road.

The teams have played a couple of common opponents this season. Toledo played Wheeling seven times and went 4-2-1 vs the Nailers. TR went 3-3-0 against Wheeling.

Both teams played the Idaho Steelheads three times. Toledo went 1-1-1 vs. the Steelheads and TR was 2-0-1 against Idaho.

This is the Walleye organization's third appearance in the Kelly Cup Finals in their past five postseasons. Toledo is seeking its first ECHL championship since 1994.

This is the first time Trois-Rivieres, which began competing in the ECHL in 2020-21, has reached the final round.

Here is a breakdown of the matchup to see which team has the edge.

### FORWARDS

The Walleye are explosive and balanced offensively. Toledo averaged 3.25 goals per contest in the regular season and scored 3.60 in the playoffs.

Trois-Rivieres, which has excelled on the power play, averaged 3.49 goals per game and is now 2.88 in the playoffs.

Toledo is led by ECHL MVP Brandon Hawkins, who led the league in scoring (89 points in 70 games) during the regular season. Hawk finished with 37 goals and 52 assists.

The line of Hawkins, Tyler Spezia, and Trenton Bliss has been one of the most productive in the ECHL. Spezia finished third on the team in scoring with 57 points in 51 games despite suffering a late-season injury. Bliss had 42 points in 57 games.

Hawkins and Bliss rank first and second in ECHL playoff scoring with 22 and 20 points, respectively.

The return of forward Mitch Lewandowski from injury

should provide a jolt for the Walleye. Lewandowski finished second on the team with 61 points in 58 regular-season games and has 11 in the playoffs. Rookie Colby Ambrosio also has surged offensively and has 11 points.

TR is led in the playoffs by forwards Alex Beaucage (14 points), Anthony Beauregard (12), Xavier Cormier (12), and Chris Jandric (11). In the regular season, Beauregard led the team in scoring with 67 points followed by Cormier (60) and Jakov Novak (57).

The teams ranked No. 1 and No. 2 in power-play production during the regular season. Toledo converted on 25.1 percent of its chances and TR finished at 24.5.

### DEFENSEMEN

The Lions are stingy and strong defensively.

TR leads the ECHL in goals against (1.63 per game) in the playoffs. The Lions gave up 2.58 goals per game during the regular season.

The Lions are led on defense by Chris Jandric, who ranks second in the ECHL in playoff scoring with 11 points in 16 games. He also led the team in the regular season (50 points in 54 games).

Toledo yielded 2.69 per game in the regular season and has given up 2.60 per game during the postseason.

Walleye defenseman Jalen Smereck leads all ECHL d-men in playoff scoring with 12 points in 15 games. Smereck ranked fifth on the team in scoring during the regular season (46 points in 70 games).

Toledo defenseman Matt Anderson also has an offensive knack with nine points in 15 playoff games, while rookie Dylan Moulton (8 points) and Colin Swoyer (7) also have been productive.

TR's penalty kill has been slightly better in the playoffs.

Also in the postseason, TR has allowed 28.88 shots on goal per game and Toledo is yield-

ing 27.40.

### GOALTENDING

The Lions have relied heavily on one No. 1 starter, Luke Cavallin. The Walleye have alternated starts in net between Jan Bednar and rookie Carter Gylander.

Cavallin earned All-ECHL second-team honors after posting a 19-10-1 record and a 2.13 goals-against average during the regular season. He also finished with a league-high .929 save percentage.

Cavallin has started in 15 of 16 postseason games for the Lions. He leads the ECHL with a 1.59 goals-against average and in wins with 11.

Cavallin also ranks second in shutouts with three and is second with a .944 save percentage. He had two shutouts in the Eastern Conference finals vs Florida.

Bednar posted a 23-8-5 record and ranked seventh in the ECHL in goals-against average (2.34) during the regular season with four shutouts and a .914 save percentage. Gylander (20-9-4 regular season) had a goals-against average (2.61) with two shutouts and a .907 save percentage.

In the playoffs, Bednar is 6-2 with a 2.52 goals-against average and a .908 save percentage. Gylander is 6-1 with a 2.59 goals-against average and .902 save percentage.

Walleye must get traffic in front of Cavallin — much like they did against KC's Jack LaFontaine in the conference finals. Fatigue could play a factor.

### COACHES

Second-year Walleye coach Pat Mikesch has led Toledo to a 22-7 record so far in two playoff appearances. Mikesch led the Walleye to a 10-4 record and conference finals last season.

Mikesch has a 92-31-20 overall record in the regular season with back-to-back regular season Central Division titles.

among the 72, 76, 68, 64 best teams in the country a way into the tournament.”

Baker cited a competitive Indiana State team falling short of the tournament as an example. Indiana State went on to play Seton Hall in the 2024 NIT title game, which he referred to as one of the best games that spring.

Kansas coach Bill Self said fellow Big 12 coaches seem to

favor an NCAA tourney expansion. The Big 12 had seven bids in 2025, half the total of the SEC.

“There was a little bit that was brought forth and the consensus among the coaches, even though it was very little, would be in favor of that,” he said.

“I don't know if you could make it where it was totally equitable all the way across the

board for everybody. Certainly, there's going to be outliers on every situation.”

Changes could come as soon as this upcoming season, but negotiations will have to move quickly.

“That would be the goal — to try and do this for next year, which is why the window to actually negotiate it will probably end sometime early summer,” he said.

The Rockets' midseason non-conference trip to Washington State on Oct. 25 is set

Stone, the director of instruction at Belmont Country Club in Perrysburg, shot his second consecutive 2-under-par 68 to finish at 4 under for the 36-hole event at Firestone Country Club's Fazio Course. He carded four birdies and two bogeys during Thursday's round.

Sowards shot 8 under over the two rounds to win the Ohio Senior Open for a record sixth time.

Amateur Howard Clendenin, who began the day one shot in front of Sowards, finished at 6 under, followed by Stone and Sam Arnold at 4 under.

It's the second time Clendenin, a Firestone member, has finished second to Sowards.

Highland Meadows pro Nick Myers shot a second-round 66, one shot off the low round of the tournament, to finish tied for sixth at 1 over. He had seven birdies in the round.

Dan Sutton from the Dan Sutton School of Golf at McDivot's driving range fired a final-round 76, an 11-shot improvement from the first day, to finish at 23 over in 78th place.

All six of Sowards' titles have come in the past seven years. The Dublin native played bogey-free all 36 holes. Last week, he was the low club pro at the Senior PGA Championship.

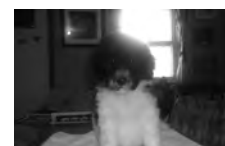
